DCIL Success Stories

Thomas can now access community services safely

Thomas Olson started working with Dakota Center for Independent Living in April 2025. Thomas' referral came to DCIL from a Home & Community case manager as Thomas had open wounds to his foot which required him to have his foot elevated for the majority of the day. His current method was utilizing his recliner to elevate his foot to allow for proper healing.

This initial request for his referral was to obtain a new recliner for him as his was non-operational and he was in a financial situation due to loss of work where he could not afford a new chair. The North Dakota Transition and Diversion Program (NDTDP) assisted him with obtaining a new recliner.

The Transition Coordinator noticed Thomas' deck was about a foot lower than the level of his door to his home. Thomas was using a makeshift step to gain access to the home and the steps to his home were too steep without accessibility support rails for safety.

Thomas worked with a Transition Coordinator to fill out a Rehabilitation Access Program (RAP) application. Thomas worked hard to get all the documentation necessary to complete the application. The application was approved and Richard Long, a general contractor for A Long Products, had completed the rebuild of his deck. The deck was built level with the doorway for easier access and had ADA compliant handrails installed. This new build now assists Thomas in ascending and descending stairs to access community services and other needs.

Thomas expressed his gratitude for the NDTDP as well as A Long Products for the completion of his new deck.



Thomas no longer has to fear a potential fall when he leaves his home with the deck now level with the front door. Thomas is excited he can finally access community services safely.

She was not able to be discharged

from the hospital until a ramp was installed for her to get in and out of her home safely.

I was brought in to help with getting paperwork signed for RAP Grant, but I suggested we use the ramp that we had in our garage and that way we would not need RAP Grant funding. Her TC in Minot went out to her home to get the measurements for me to see if the ramp we had would work and she was then informed that this woman's neighbors had come together and built her a brand-new ramp on their own.

She was now able to return to her home which she was very excited about.

What great neighbors to do that for her when she was in need!

Unusual accessible device made available to Geordan

I worked with Geordan to get an unusual accessible device, a cross-trainer exercise bike that he can use without side effects due to his disability and get the exercise recommended by his doctor.

Geordan had tried several other agencies that help with assistive devices and equipment, but due to it not meeting the definition of an accessible device, they could not fund the purchase. I also provided him with a needed medicine cabinet and Geordan is very happy and grateful for both.

I will continue to work with Geordan to identify any other needed accessible devices for the post transition period. I called a few weeks later to check in with Geordan. Geordan said the exercise machine is working great for him. I told him I was happy we were able to help. Geordan said, "You not only helped, I feel like you saved my life. The doctor couldn't believe how well I am doing, I feel so great. My A1C is down, and I have lost 15 pounds. The bike is so easy to use, if your legs get tired, you use your arms more and switch back when needed."

I'm so glad I work with the Transiton and Diversion Program (TDP). It continues to help people like this.

Mary's independence now allows her inclusiveness

Mary Engesser started working with Dakota Center for Independent living on Dec 3rd, 2024.

Mary was diagnosed with severe fibromyalgia which limits her abilities to perform manual tasks and perform selfcare. She is cared for by her Husband Bob Engesser. Mary was struggling to access community services as her accessibility ramp needed repairs to make it fully functional again. Mary had requested assistance through the Transition and Diversion Program.

Richard Long, general contractor had met with Mary and Bob to identify the needs for the repair and agreed on the work. Mary's ramp repair was completed on March 8th, 2025.

Mary is now able to access community services without the fear of her accessibility ramp not being able to support the weight of Mary and her wheelchair. Additional anti-slip guards were also placed on the accessibility ramp to improve traction/grip in the winter months as her accessibility ramp tends to become icy after freezing rain or snow. The icy ramp conditions impacted her ability to access community services and other social functions. With the repairs to her accessibility ramp Mary's level of independence is now much greater.

Mary's independence now allows her more inclusiveness when it comes to socialization in the Bismarck community.

Buster the cat finds his forever home with a little help

This is Buster the cat. Buster is a 10-yr-old, orange tabby cat who is playful, loves humans, and is very curious. Buster's owner (a consumer of McCallie's) could no longer take care of him and made the selfless decision to give Buster the life he needs and deserves. McCallie got this news on a Thurs. afternoon and needed to have Buster rehomed by Fri.

McCallie called shelters and foster homes from Bismarck/Mandan, Minot, Dickinson, and Fargo. DCIL Advocates Miah and Stephanie knew how time sensitive this was and helped by calling multiple people and posting Buster on social media. McCallie also posted Buster on Bisman to help get him a new foster or permanent home. Advocate Miah found Lynn through her mother and Lynn stated that she was looking for an older, orange, declawed cat. She had not seen Buster before she made her statement. Lynn has had cats in the past, but they have since passed. Lynn's husband passed in 2020, and she had just moved into a new home where she was feeling lonely. She saw Buster's picture and loved him immediately!

McCallie picked Buster up from his original home and brought him back to the office where staff got to have some much-needed pet therapy before her and Miah took him to his new home. Lynn and Buster bonded almost immediately. He was very calm and curious about her and his new home. Miah and McCallie stayed with Lynn for a while to make sure



she had all the information she needed. Lynn is so happy that she now has Buster, and she is very excited to provide him the life he deserves for the last half of his life.
